THE MISSION

This Spring, Medical Teams Worldwide was asked by the TAK Foundation to give medical relief and immunizations to the Kamosi region of western Kenya near the Ugandan border. The TAK foundation is an indigenous non-profit organization with programs that works with vulnerable communities focusing on marginalized women and children. This trip was also planned in concert with the Kenyan Health Authorities to augment their immunization and de-worming programs for the area. Specifically there were 4 villages that needed help: Cheptulu, Makucki, Senede and Kamulon Suji villages. The team arrived in Nairobi on the first day and staged equipment and supplies at the Medical Teams Worldwide facility. The next morning the team drove the 300 miles to the Kamosi region and set up camp at the rural home of Ngari Musumba the director of the TAK foundation.

On the first day the team visited Cheptulu village and set up the clinic in a local small one room church. The team immunized 60 children for tetanus and measles, mumps and rubella along with de-worming them. Also, 125 pairs of reading glasses were distributed

to the elderly who could not read due to presbyopia of aging. Dr Kelley and Scritah, a local health officer, saw 275 patients for malaria, bronchitis, diarrhea and severe chronic tropical wounds of the legs.

The next day, the team traveled to Makucki village, where working again in a one room church, the team saw 285 patients for immunizations and de-worming and 250 patients were seen for medical needs such as malaria, diarrhea, upper respiratory infections, and open wounds.

On the third day the team worked in Senede village. During the visit, 280 patients were seen for medical care and immunizations and de-worming. There were a number of people with large tropical ulcers on their legs

Finally, on the last day of clinic in the village of Kamulon Suji, the team was able to treat 270 patients for medical illnesses and 235 children were de-wormed and immunized. A large number of people had infected ears and upper respiratory infections. In that village

about 10 % of the children showed severe protein malnutrition. On the last day, the left over immunizations were donated to the local Kamosi County Health facility to use up thye following week after the team left.

In each village, the village elders and the patients were very happy and thankful to Medical Teams Worldwide for the immunizations and the medical care rendered.
